Eoin Colfe	<b>Airman</b>	Set in Ireland in the future. A rebel boy must escape from prison in order to clear his name.
Susan Cooper	<b>Ghost Hawk</b>	Little Hawk must go deep into the forest where he will endure a three-month test of solitude and survival.

Fabio Geda	<b>In The Sea There Are Crocodiles</b>	Enaiatollah's journey begins when his mother leaves him at a refugee camp in Pakistan. From here, he uses his wits and the help of fellow 'illegals' as he struggles to survive in search of a better life.
