INTRODUCTION



Dear Parents and Guardians,

I am delighted to be reflecting on an action-packed summer term that has been full of learning, challenge and excitement. Duke of Edinburgh Award expeditions, sports days, trips and visits have been a welcome counterpoint to the intense weeks given over for end-of-year examinations, GCSEs, A-levels and BTEC assessments. Move over, Year 11 Prom, because the Year 6 Disco was the undisputed party of the year, with much excitement and singing along to a certain Mr Rick Astley, ironically a pop legend from my own childhood.

Our term has ended with a farewell Year 6 moving up assembly and an ambitiously accomplished performance at the Senior School of the satirical *Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui* by Bertolt Brecht. The Prizegiving ceremonies at The Rose Theatre for the Prep School and Senior School

were truly gala occasions where the spotlight was shone brightly on our children and young people, not to overlook our little ones in Nursery and Reception at their own special event. Academic, sporting, creative and performing arts achievements were rightly celebrated. My greatest joy, however, was seeing the qualities of leadership, teamwork and friendship given equal billing. Mrs Macallister's Prep Prizegiving speech focused on the theme of each individual child writing and singing their own song, an extended metaphor for our young people creating their own futures, more of which you can read about in Tales from the Turret.

I love the imagery in Stephen Spender's valedictory poem, *The Truly Great*, which came to mind as I watched our young people walk across the red carpeted stage, each for their own moment of recognition, admiration and honour: "... Near the snow, near the sun, in the highest fields,

See how these names are fêted by the waving grass

And by the streamers of white cloud

And whispers of wind in the listening sky."

I include below the text of my speech as a memento of the Senior School Prizegiving event, and I trust that it will give you a flavour of the evening, if you were unable to be there.

Prizegiving Speech

Welcome to Ewell Castle Prize-giving and how lovely to gather once again at the Rose Theatre in Kingston. Indeed, in this Coronation year of His Majesty King Charles III we stand close to the original site where Anglo Saxon kings were crowned within a Coronation Stone's throw from here: Æthelstan was consecrated king at Kingston in 925, Eadred in 946 and Æthelred the Unready in 979.

Hence its name Kingston. Just opposite this theatre, the sarsen Coronation Stone, upon which Anglo-Saxon kings stood to be crowned, is on display for all to see. And this is but one tiny example of Ewell Castle's mission to educate you all, finding the learning in every moment. Historians are, as yet, unable to confirm whether Quiche was traditionally served at any of these Anglo-Saxon Coronation ceremonies.

Our Year 11 and Year 13 pupils have just completed their public examinations, following an immense effort in their focus and studies. I am

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proud of you all, as your Principal, for your resilience and determination, and the effort that you have all invested in your futures. I am looking forward to seeing you all on results days in August and, don't worry, I won't get any sleep the night before either.

I cannot possibly mention all the extraordinary achievements in the cocurricular and enrichment arenas this year. Model United Nations, The Great Debate, the return of Croquet and lunchtime recitals, visiting speakers and lunches for our Scholars' groups all thrived this academic year, and who can forget Ewell Castle's Enterprise Village, Dragon's Den and the initiatives of the Charitable Works Committee to support The Children's Trust and the Food Bank, amongst other good causes.

Our sustainability focus was further enhanced with the addition of a hot composter and our "ground force" champions, who set about reclaiming and managing different areas of the Castle Site, mimicking the trampling movements of wild boar in the undergrowth (yes – that is a thing), restoring a pond and planting native species, including several trees. Big trees from little acorns grow. Our young people are sowing seeds into our future – someone has to.

After the summer expedition to Romania in the summer of 2022, Duke of Edinburgh activities have gone from strength to strength with the legendary Mr Blencowe at the helm, aided and abetted by Messrs Hall and Skinner, ensuring that continuing generations of Ewellians learn how to cook their own delicacies over an open flame, as well as igniting in them the passion for the great outdoors and a strong connection with the natural world. Our strategic mission to inculcate sustainable habits and to care about our world becomes even more compelling when we spend quality time embracing outdoor learning experiences. During the Cairngorms Gold wild camping

expedition, Mr Hall also learned to his cost that Avon's Skin Soft Oil Body Spray does not in fact repel insects (as urban mythology suggests) – and he still has the midge bite scars to prove it. Although, to be fair, his skin has never felt so soft and supple.

In performing arts, the School Musical returned to the Epsom Playhouse - we quite literally did "move on down the road" to perform The Wiz as a cast of talented young performers took to the stage for a number of spectacularly choreographed dances, wonderful singing and some hilarious comic turns from a number of entertaining characters such as the Scarecrow, Tin Man and Cowardly Lion. And the summer term musical concert returned to St Mary's Church for an eclectic and accomplished repertoire of playing and singing, taking in classical, choral, Chilcott's Jazz Mass, and contemporary music, including some original compositions - a truly magical evening that moved many to tears. And next week, we will be experiencing the sold-out Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui by Bertolt Brecht.

In the sporting arena, our teams in rugby, football, netball, and cricket continued to build great momentum, with an extraordinary 85% of our involved in sliqua competitive fixtures this year, further energised by a successful cricket tour in Dubai. The Sports Awards this week were testament to this, with standing room only for the many who were recognised and rewarded. A huge thanks must go to our Director of Sport, Mr Neil Turk (sponsored by Ambre Solaire in Dubai) and his exceptional team of sporting staff whose level of dedication has been much admired by us all.

I must mention a few individual sporting achievements: Liv Barfoot-Saunt won golds in the Southern Counties and Kent International Judo competition; Finlay Rhys Jones was selected to row for Great Britain in the J16 this summer; Ben Atkinson was silver medallist in the U14 European Hockey League finals in Holland; Henry Bale in Year 10 was runner-up in the *Schools Golf* at Windlesham and Piltdown; and, Charlie Miller who won Gold at the IAPS indoor skiing championships in the slalom, also taking Gold in the British Inter Schools slalom and grand slalom (amongst many other competitions) and finished his season with Gold in the grand slalom in the British Championships to become British Champion.

In elite tennis, our Tennis Academy has excelled this year. Lexie Macdonald and Ella Alleyne won the 18U Girls' Surrey Schools' Tennis Festival and our Senior Boys' Team successfully defended their title at LTA's Surrey Championships, on a nail-biting tiebreaker to retain the Rootham Shield. Although our Tennis Academy players are all currently competing at the National Finals in Nottingham, Mrs McManus and Mrs Battista have sped back to our Ceremony this evening, and I would now like to call on our Chair of Governors, Mr Colin Griffith, to congratulate them personally on a stunningly successful year in tennis.

And now, on to academic matters (yes - we do actually do some work!) and our core mission that children should discover their strengths and cultivate intellectual curiosity! Our their commitment to developing a growth mindset in our young people and to stimulate their higher order thinking skills was recognised by NACE (The National Association for Able Children in Education) who accredited us for our highly effective stretch and challenge in the classroom and commitment to rigour in our pupils' learning power. World Book Day costumes were as creative as ever this year and, during STEM week, we experimented with water rockets, egg drop challenge and Spaghetti Towers. We also enjoyed the ever-popular Pi Day and the UK Maths Challenge initiative.



In the summer term, we threw ourselves in to Creative Arts Week and also raised awareness through Mental Health Week, busting myths and challenging stigmas. Our lifeaffirming Pride Week culminated with a magnificently inclusive Rainbowthemed picnic to round off a number of other exciting events. No sooner have our Year 7 pupils returned from Paris then another intrepid group will soon be off to Switzerland. While New York may be the city that never sleeps, I do wonder if Ewell Castle might be the School that never sleeps!

I would like to offer a vote of thanks to all our young people who threw themselves into so many learning opportunities this year. You have brought so much to our School's community. And finally, I would like to offer a vote of thanks and appreciation for all your teachers and educational support staff. And also, to our Governors, particularly our Chair Mr Colin Griffith, who gives so much of his time and dedication to Ewell Castle.

Wonderful events like this do not happen by accident and much work goes on behind the scenes with organisation and logistics. Thank you all for your contributions, in particular Mrs Natalie Ruthnum and Mr Ben Essenhigh. I hope that you enjoyed celebrating with us this evening and please do have a wonderful summer vacation.

Estates Update

These are exciting and busy times for us as a learning community and I am pleased to share our continuing ambitions for facilitating our pupils' learning experience:

- We are currently waiting for planning permission to be granted for the refurbishment and expansion of our tennis courts, with work hopefully commencing soon
- Phase One of The Pledger (Science, Maths, DT and Art building) refurbishment will commence this summer vacation, creating another Science lab and paving the way for Phase Two during the following summer vacation in 2024
- The top floor of Fitzalan House has been acquired one year ahead of schedule to create discrete private study spaces, additional seminar rooms and offices for our 6th Form provision – refurbishment is already underway
- Preparations are advanced for welcoming Year 1 and Year 2 in September to our Glyn House Prep setting, with classrooms being redecorated, refurbished and specially furnished

- At Chessington Lodge, classroom spaces, facilities and equipment will be re-organised during the summer vacation to facilitate 6th Form teaching and learning from September 2023
- In September, we will kick off the process with our architect and planning consultants to re-locate our EYFS provision to our Glyn House site for September 2024

However you may be spending your summer vacation, I wish you much fun and refreshment with family and friends. I look forward to seeing our Year 13 families on the 17th August for A-level and BTEC results, and then our Year 11 families for their GCSE results on the 24th August, from 8:00am on both dates.






YEAR 7 PARIS TRIP










SIXTH FORM TRIP TO SURREY UNIVERSITY



On Tuesday 22nd June, Ewell Castle Sixth Form embarked upon a trip to Surrey University, located in the city of Guildford. Showcasing a wide range of facilities and the strong community, the university presented its commitment to excellence, leaving us with a lasting impression and memorable experience.

Our tour began mid-morning where we were introduced to the team of student ambassadors who welcomed us with a Q&A session, highlighting the aspects of student life away from the classroom. The team of ambassadors were approachable and enthusiastic, reflecting the university's commitment to providing a supportive learning environment for all. During the Q&A, the team educated us about a variety of topics such as: education, Student Union, facilities, events and more. The ambassadors highlighted the university's academic strengths and rewarding student life, given that they had ranked 9th in student satisfaction and received a 1st place ranking in the UK for certain subjects such as criminology and civil engineering. In addition, the university's Student Union plays a pivotal role in enhancing student life outside of studying, including trips abroad to ski and learn about other cultures. Additionally, the ambassadors expressed the university's strong ties with certain industries within the UK and abroad, providing students with opportunities for graduate jobs and internships.

As students themselves, the team of ambassadors shared tips and experiences of their own life at Surrey. The team encouraged us to participate in societies to make new friends and improve our own social skills and abilities, while also encouraging us to maintain a positive work life balance.

After our student Q&A, we were given a guided tour of the university grounds. The tour included a visit to impressive facilities such as the *Innovation for Health Laboratory and the Advanced Technology Institute for Engineering and Physics*. These facilities illustrated how the University is dedicated to student success and its commitment to research and innovation. In addition, other interesting places on the campus included: the BBC News' headquarters, the new Business and Drama schools as well as a variety of restaurants and hubs for student relaxation. Additionally, the ambassadors informed us about a variety of clubs and societies, including societies related to culture, sport and identity - creating a positive sense of inclusivity and engagement that permeated the campus.

It was a very useful experience to visit and learn about the university in preparation for when we begin university next year.

CHILD'S CHAIR PROJECT





This term, we were excited to hear about the new project in Design and Technology; building a child's chair for a real-life client. We had never completed a project before involving a client, as previously all our DT projects didn't require the consideration of our clients' 'needs' and 'wants'. However, with this project we were allocated a client and were challenged to create the most complex product we had ever constructed, which satisfied another person's requirements.

At the start of the project we met our clients, who were Year 1 pupils in the Prep School. We carried out our research, comprising of asking various questions that we prepared before meeting the clients. These questions ranged from functionality, design, and asking about their own interests. This questionnaire gave us a better understanding of who our clients were and what style of chair they would like us to create.

Next we sketched a multitude of ideas to create a clearer picture of our chairs and what we intended to create. Our drawings and ideas changed over time as we improved the functionality, design and ease of construction (in preparation for when we came to build the chairs). We used different techniques when sketching the chairs such as drawing on isometric paper, including dimensions and viewpoints of the chair.

When it came to building the chairs, we constructed a base with four wooden leas and four wooden rails that were connected with screws. If our chair was to be a different shape (for example, larger or cut in half for storage) we would work around the original skeleton and change the dimensions or mirror it. Then everyone built up from this frame to create their own designs, using mostly MDF. To decorate the chairs, we used the laser cutter to accurately cut shapes and writing from materials like MDF and coloured acrylic. Additionally, we used paints (both spray paints and acrylic paints) to apply a coloured finish.

When the chairs were finished, we met with the clients for the last time to give them the chairs and ask for their feedback. We paired the client's feedback with our own, to create a detailed evaluation of how our chair performed functionally and aesthetically for our clients.

This has been one of the most challenging DT projects we have faced and was an important learning experience for projects. We really enjoyed the challenge and hope the Year 1 pupils found our designs useful.




Feedback from Year 1 parents







YEAR 9 DUKE OF EDINBURGH TRAINING WEEK, 26TH - 30TH JUNE 2023









The whole of Year 9 were taken off timetable for a comprehensive week of training. All the training - bar a specialised first aid course - was given by Ewell Castle Staff and over 30 staff were involved at some stage.

The ethos of the week was for the staff to teach the pupils first, then do the activity with them, before leaving them to complete it by themselves.

On Monday, the pupils mastered map reading, the use of a compass, cooking, road safety and camp craft.

On Tuesday, they completed an orienteering course at Nonsuch and a first aid course with Josh Miller, an old Ewellian.

On Wednesday, they went down to Banstead to practise practical navigation. As the day went on the staff took a back seat as the pupils navigated themselves.

On Thursday, they started their practice expedition on Epsom Downs. Very few mistakes were made and those were quickly corrected. They camped over at school before completing a map reading route back to Epsom Downs. Most of the groups got everything right but it was towards the end when a few mistakes were made by tired pupils losing concentration. However, making mistakes is all part of the learning process.

I was really impressed with the teamwork and determination showed by the Year 9s. We are all looking forward to the real expedition on the weekend of the 16/17th September. It is a bit tougher, but I am sure they will rise to the occasion. In the meantime, pupils need to think about their kit - what worked and what was not needed. They also need to make as much progress as they can with their other activities.

SIXTH FORM ENRICHMENT ACTIVITIES

At Ewell Castle, we take part in a variety of weekly Enrichment activities that are not only enjoyable but also develop skills which will be useful for the future. Over a couple of weeks, we learned the steps in applying for a graduate job. Ben McManus shared his experience of applying for a graduate job, including his achievements and struggles. After this, we continued with a whole year group Kahoot quiz where it replicated the questions we might be asked in a job interview. The top 8 winners participated in a one-way online interview, a group interview and finally answering questions from Ben. An example question was 'Explain



how you have led a team through a stressful situation.' The selected students had to show knowledge, confidence and competence and were given an individual score on each question; the overall winner was Sam Freestone. This Enrichment session was especially important as it gave everyone a detailed understanding of the graduate application process, and how to apply oneself in the workplace.

With university just around the corner for Year 12s, we started completing our UCAS applications, with the help of Mrs McManus, our Head of Year, and Miss Monk, the Careers Advisor. We received plenty of help completing the many sections of the application and everyone had to be very cautious as one mistake could possibly lead to a rejection from university. The most important part of the application is your personal statement, therefore we have spent many Enrichment sessions going through which details to include and phrases to use, with the teachers correcting and helping us at every point, to ensure our personal statements stand out. Mrs McManus is currently checking everyone's personal statements prior to submission, to add additional information and corrections, giving everyone the best chance of securing a university offer. Everyone has been very supportive during this time, with subject teachers also offering to help and give advice, along with our form tutors helping to make sure we are on track.

Last week, we had a very interesting Enrichment session which involved designing our own university bedroom! We were split into groups





STUDENT COUNCIL UPDATE



Over the 2022-2023 school year. the Student Council undertook 3 main projects spanning the fields of logistics, catering, and teaching. Meetings were held bi-weekly with representatives from each form congregating in the DT Workshop to discuss current projects and any feedback we'd received from members of the upper and lower school. At the start of the year, it was noted that there was a lack of sufficient seating for pupils across the School, particularly around the Budgell and Croquet Lawn. As the School numbers have increased from previous years, our Logistics Committee saw it fit to install benches across heavily populated areas. Safety checks and budgeting led to 6 new seats (from one of the UK's leading suppliers of sustainably source furniture) being installed, with thanks to our PTA. Feedback has been positive, and I have seen a great reduction in traffic and disputes over seating since the change.

Catering adjustments have by far been the most common type of request from pupils this year, so a lot of time and effort has been spent on trying to improve the dining experience. A school-wide survey asked pupils what kind of ready-made and dessert options they would like to see added to the lunch menu. Notably, 66% of pupils believed that meal quality was their key concern, with portion size and availability being considered much less important, so meetings were held with the School catering staff to discuss practical dietary implementations. Discussion amongst the Catering Committee and Mr Leigh led to a largely successful trial run of food at break times outside the Sixth Form, modification of the queue system to increase throughput via a new sandwich bar and an overall improvement to the dietary accommodations for pupils.

Discussion of the School's reward and punishment system has also taken place, particularly on the uneven distribution of merits and sanctions available. Pupil feedback suggested that although rewards such as commendations and merits existed, they were outnumbered by different types of issues, detentions, and levels that a pupil could receive. The Teaching Committee focused on both trying to develop new positive reinforcement schemes and developing the notion of



behavioural merits rectifying issues. Although these ideas need critical development, I believe tackling this imbalance would provide a steady foundation for future pupil-led conversations about learning.

New water stations have been situated across the School premises, to encourage the use of reusable water bottles and ensure that pupils in PE or games lessons can get a fresh water more easily. Combined with the benches and new lunch queue system, crowding has reduced significantly across the Quad and Budgell areas. The Logistics Committee has also received a remarkable number of requests to redesign the basin for sports, particularly football. Different years using the basin on a rota basis would help prevent friction, along with the cross-use of year-specific equipment. This would result in massively expanding the area of play for pupils and reducing tension between year groups. These logistical decisions also have a profound effect on the social and communal aspects of school life, allowing our committees to resolve problems in multiple areas with one solution.

Ultimately, I am very proud of the work that the Student Council completed during this academic year. I have no doubt that our system will continue to evolve over time, perhaps decreasing the entry year for candidates so presidents can graduate to mentorship roles in Year 13, allowing extra time for their studies. It has been an absolute pleasure working with Mrs Sarmiento, my peers in the council and the rest of the staff. I hope that the groundwork that has been laid here will spur on explosive growth for generations to come.

It was another full day of tennis training and school work today at Ewell Castle School.

After my private session with Tom, I return to School and return to lessons.

At lunchtime, the tennis scholars from all the year groups come together and play mini tennis on the courts at School. This is great fun and can be very competitive at times.

Following afternoon lessons, I take the train home and then travel by car to my evening training session at St George's College, Weybridge, where I train until 7pm. This is great hitting practice, to put into play what I have been working and to prepare for upcoming tournaments or School fixtures.

I get home at 7.45pm and am exhausted. I eat dinner, which is usually a big bowl of pasta! I then complete any remaining homework, as I realise the importance of keeping up with my school work and achieving good grades. I also understand the importance of listening to my body and not overtraining. Sometimes, rest is more important than training.

Before I go to bed, I pack my bag for the next day and give my tennis rackets, which need restringing, to my Dad. I try to go to bed at 9.30pm and usually fall asleep in 5 minutes. I recharge, ready to do it all again tomorrow!

I'm so grateful to have the opportunity to be a tennis scholar. It's a lot of hard work, both in training and at school but it is also incredibly rewarding. I love being able to train with a great coach, and top national level players. Having such a good group of tennis scholars to train with is invaluable. We all help each other to improve and achieve our goals. Above all, we are really good friends and I know how lucky I am to be doing what I love the most.

Sometimes, I have the opportunity to play in an LTA tournament or a School fixture during the school day. It is great to have the support from the School and of course I have to maintain my school work. I am very grateful for the academic support if I need it.



I'm really looking forward to my upcoming tournaments. I've been working really hard on my strength and conditioning, and I am confident that I can perform well and move to the next level. Over the next few months, I am really looking forward to my School tennis fixtures, especially trying to qualify for the National finals. It will also be great when we have our new School tennis courts.

The most important thing for me is to keep improving in both my tennis and my school work. Above all, it's about enjoying this tennis journey that I am on.



Finally, I want to say a huge 'thank you' to Mrs. Battista who has taken up a position as a Business and Economics teacher at another school. A DAY IN THE LIFE OF APEX2100 SKI ACADEMY

My name is Charlie Miller, and I am in Year 7.

I started skiing on family holidays when I was 4 years old and became good enough to join the Mountain Masters Children's Ski Race Team in Val D'Isere when I was 9. Due to the pandemic lockdowns, I could not ski for a year and a half. However, following a successful trial in the October 2022 half-term, I was offered a place at Apex2100 Ski Academy in the under 12 performance programme for the 2023 winter season.

Apex2100 is an international ski academy based in Tignes in France and is one of the world's leading ski academies for young ski racers. It is a new purposebuilt facility located next to the ski slopes. I am in the under 12 group which has a dormitory for 6 boys and a dormitory for 6 girls. In my group there were 2 Australians, 1 French, 1 Greek and a Spanish child; the rest were British. The season runs from the beginning of December to the end of April and there are various race training and fitness camps through the summer and autumn as well.

We ski five mornings a week and do schoolwork in the afternoons and all-day Tuesday. We have Saturday afternoon and Sunday off. A typical day would involve leaving the Academy at 8:30am and skiing until 12.30pm, we then have lunch followed by lessons in the afternoon. We do a mix of gate training and free skiing, and occasionally go to the freestyle park or ski bumps and powder when conditions permit. The focus is mainly on ski race training, and we take part in a number of regional French races and national British races throughout the season. Every day we do an hour of 'strength and conditioning' training which can include core strength, balance exercises (wobble board and tight rope), and gymnastics on the air mat. We may also do rollerblading, trampolining and ice hockey.

MORE ABLE AND TALENTED CLUB (MAT) SUMMER TERM UPDATE



The summer term saw the MAT Club (for Scholars and open to all pupils) focus on the Torrence Test. The Torrance Test measures creativity via verbal and figural which ties in with the World Economic Forum's Top 10 Skills of 2025. E Paul Torrance (Professor of Educational Psychology) was one of the first to recognise that creativity is part of intellect. This debunks IQ tests as the sole measure of intelligence.

The group were introduced to the stages of the test which start with fluency and considers the amount of ideas followed by flexibility in terms of thinking of ideas from different perspectives. Originality and then elaboration of these ideas are then employed to increase novel responses. The groups were excited to let their imaginations run free resulting in some very interesting ideas.

The second half of the term looked at public speaking. Collectively, the group identified the key features in delivering speeches such as body language, being prepared and knowing your audience. Pupils were encouraged to give diplomatic feedback and to also consider when these oratory skills would be needed in life. I was immensely proud of the pupils who stood up in front of their peers and presented on a subject of their choice.

Academic mentoring group sessions focused on problem solving, by asking questions on how to modify starting points such as story writing or product design. Questioning from the pupils themselves rather than simply responding to teachers is a Building Learning Power area that also ties in with Higher Order Thinking (HOT).

The Scholars' Talk this term was given by Adrian Berry. Mr Berry was a former pupil at Ewell Castle and left after his A-levels in 1980. Since then, he has successfully cofounded a consultancy firm called 'Factorydesign' which specialises aircraft interiors, consumer products and transportation. The pupils were thrilled to hear about the impact he had on designing the interior of Concorde. This was especially of interest to a Year 13 student who will start working and designing for British Airways in the autumn, as well as future designers in the younger years.
